# Peers as Partners in Learning

#### **Course Description**

This course is designed to provide reciprocal academic and social benefits to students with disabilities and their peers without disabilities. Students will learn and apply knowledge and skilled practices in the areas of academic engagement, communication, social barriers, leadership, problem solving, and other disabilityrelated topics such as historical perspectives, inclusion, Universal Design for Learning, person-first language, presumed competence, social justice for minority populations, and media representation of diverse people.

#### **Primary Text:**

While there is no particular textbook, you will be assigned various readings intended to explore various topics, situational problem solving skills, and navigating social issues.

#### **Course Goals**

- Understand legal rights of people with disabili-• ties and their families.
- Apply the concepts of confidentiality and self • determination.
- Awareness and understanding of disability rights issues.
- Apply methods for problem-solving and advoca-CY.
- Promote learning for people with disabilities through academic, communication, physical, and social supports
- Facilitate meaningful peer relationships. •
- Facilitate team and cooperative learning skills among all students.
- Application of critical thinking and decisionmaking skills.
- Contribute to the community via civic responsi-• bility.
- Assess and evaluate the impact of course efforts on self and others.

#### "Classroom" Expectations:
